Administrative Summary for Consent Agenda August 2022 Data

Minutes - No changes.

Revenue & Expenditure Dashboard Report

- Unaudited Actual Beginning Fund Balance is higher than anticipated. Majority of revenues (tax receipts) don't come in until November.
- Expenditures are currently tracking within target goal of 17%.

Operations Overview Dashboard Report

- Fire response was down for the month of August.
- Ambulance transports increased for the month over last year.

Bank Statements and Reconciliations

LGIP (Local Government Investment Pool)-General Fund

 Total sum of all funds balances with the bank and totals \$2,692,076.56 at the end of August. The interest rate increased to 1.58%.

LGIP -Debt Service Fund

• Total sum of funds in the debt service account balances with the bank and totals \$61,287.56.

U.S. Bank

• Total sum of funds in US Bank checking at end of August balances with the bank and totals \$19,396.87. *The bank reconciliation includes two bank adjustments for two outstanding fraudulent ACH debits for a total of \$14,576.52. Staff continues to work with US Bank on the issue.

Operating Fund Summaries

Revenue

- Current Property taxes will not start coming in until November.
- GEMT Revenue is related to Coordinated Care Program.
- The OSFM Staffing Grant was received in the amount of \$35,000.
- The interest rate for LGIP increased to 1.58%.

Expenditures

All expenditures are tracking within target goal of 17% overall.

Balance Sheets

- FICA/FWH Tax Liability is due to a Paychex adjustment on an employee's paycheck due to additional Social Security withheld and should clear at a later date.
- PERS liability includes new temporary employee wages and should clear when PERS updates their system, likely in September/October.
- Insurance disability liability and miscellaneous liabilities are due to AFLAC employee payments and employee donations. These will clear next month.

- <u>Check number 13853 to City of Sisters</u>. This is the budgeted payment for our portion of assistance with the facilitation of the Sisters Visioning Process as approved by the Board of Directors.

- <u>Check number 13883 to TargetSolutions Learning, LLC.</u> Annual payment for training data management system.








REVENUE & EXPENDITURE OVERVIEW - AS OF AUGUST 2022

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Sisters-Camp Sherman Rural Fire Protection District August 16, 2022

- 1. Board Vice President Kristie Miller opened the meeting at 5 p.m.
 - a. Board Attending: Vice President Miller, Secretary/Treasurer McGowan (via telephone), and Director Sutton. Absent: President Chuck Newport and Director Schulz.
 - Staff Attending: Fire Chief Roger Johnson, Executive Assistant Julie Spor, Finance Manager Kay Johnson, Deputy Chief Craig, Fire Medic Frutos. Absent: Fire Safety Manager Doug Green.

2. Consent agenda

a. Unanimously approved the Consent Agenda as presented with no questions or discussion. Motion by Secretary McGowan, second Director Sutton.

3. Correspondence:

a. Reviewed letters/cards from Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show and the Bergstrom Family.

4. Administration

a. Staff Reports:

- Unanimously approved Staff Report SR-22-1 and corresponding Resolution 2022-2023-001 regarding the Station 701/703 Interior/Exterior Painting Project. Motion by Secretary McGowan, Director Sutton second.
- ii. Unanimously approved Staff Report SR-22-2 and corresponding Resolution 2022-2023-002 regarding Community Hall AV System Upgrade Project. Motion by Director Sutton, Secretary McGowan second.

b. Station 703 Rename Discussion:

i. Chief Johnson provided a recap of this topic discussed at the July 2022 meeting. Chief Johnson contacted leadership at the Squaw Creek Canyon Homeowner's Association and received results of the HOA's poil regarding the subdivision renaming. Their results matched the District poll with the lead name of Whychus Canyon as the new name. 80% of their residents are supportive of the change with some concerned about legal documents and some critical with the political correctness of the issue. From a legal perspective, the Fire District has no legal documents that would be impacted by a name change, and only internal documents would be impacted. After some discussion with the Board, the consensus was for staff to remove all references of "Squaw Creek" in any internal documents related to Station 703 and replace with "Station 703." The Board will delay further action until the community decides on a path forward regarding the name of the subdivision.

c. Wildfire Risk Map Update

 Chief Johnson reported that Oregon Department of Forestry has paused the map and appeals process due to community feedback. There will be community feedback on the new map before its completion. The new map is planned to be completed prior to the end of 2022. The Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal is developing a coordinated communications plan moving forward. There is a lot of work being done around this issue and a lot of insurance impact questions.

5. President's Report

- a. Chief Johnson Performance Review:
 - i. Vice President Miller reported that she and Secretary McGowan met with Chief Johnson to build a process for the Chief's performance review. A form was sent to all Directors and VP Miller will need that back as soon as possible to complete the process prior to the next Board meeting. In September, the Board will hold an executive session to finalize the process with Chief Johnson.

6. Fire Chief Report

- a. Chief Johnson provided a written report to the Board. He recognized the District's federal and state wildland partners for their tremendous work during the recent lightning storms. The District will see increased lightning risk this week. The National Preparedness Level is at a 3, which is good for this time of year.
- b. Chief reminded the Directors of the 8/17/22 Defensible Space Community Listening Tour scheduled in the Community Hall. All are invited to attend.
- 7. Fire Safety Manager Report
 - a. Fire Safety Manager Green provided a written report.
- 8. Other Business None.

No further business was discussed and the meeting adjourned at 5:30 p.m.



FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT MONTH-SEPTEMBER, 2022

I. FIRE ACTIVITY STATUS:

Statewide fire activity has significantly increased in the past month with local task force deployments to fires in Redmond and Prineville, along with multiple conflagrations in the state. The closest fire to the District is the Cedar Creek Fire which has crossed into southern Deschutes County and is currently over 92,000 acres in size. Smoke impacts from the Cedar Creek Fire have impacted the Sisters community.

II. NOTEWORTHY OPERATIONAL EVENTS:

Sisters Fire responded to local task force activations in the past month and supported statewide mobilizations with a command vehicle and task force leader trainee. We have been short one staff member as Travis Martin went to work for the City of Bend Fire Department. Many of our career staff have been working extra shifts and it has been difficult to staff engines for out of district response to conflagrations.

IV. SPECIAL PROJECTS UPDATE:

- 1. We currently have one opening for a career firefighter/paramedic. After the close of applications we didn't have enough applicants to proceed with an exam. We are appointing Resident Volunteer Rachel Ulm to a temporary position and will re-advertise the position during the coming winter/spring.
- 2. We have appointed Karla Cross to the vacant position of Recruitment and Retention Coordinator to fill out the remainder of the grant period. Karla brings a tremendous amount of program management and marketing experience to the position.
- 3. There continues to be a lot of uncertainty with the wildfire risk map and corresponding legislative impacts. The outcome of the fall election season is likely to impact SB 762 and its implementation timeline. We are hearing of several legislative concepts designed to reduce the impacts of SB 762.
- 4. Kay and Julie are continuing to work with US Bank and SDAO to recover funds that were illegally transferred. Chief Craig has also met with Deschutes County Sheriff's Office regarding the issue. We have been informed that a check has been issued to reimburse the District for one of the transfers but we have not received the check at this time. US Bank has instituted protective measures to prevent future transfers and we will be opening a new account to reduce future risk.
- 5. District Mechanic Tom Ward has given his notice that he will be retiring in October. Tom has committed to performing annual inspections and pump testing prior to his departure. We will need to develop a plan for fleet maintenance services going forward.
- 6. We will be hosting a strategic planning session with George Dunkel from SDAO on November 7th from 0830-1200 hrs. If you are able to block out time to participate in the process it would be great.
- 7. Sarah is reviewing district plans and documents and updating our terminology for station 703. Sarah is finding very few updates needed so far.

V. <u>VOLUNTEER STATUS:</u>

We are not planning a fall volunteer recruit academy at this time. Karla will be focusing recruitment efforts in the Metolius Basin. We will schedule an academy in Camp Sherman when we have some candidates interested in the training.
