Words from the Fire Chief



It is an honor to present the Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District's (District) 2023 Annual Report. This report provides an overview of how the District is governed, current staffing levels, services provided, annual budget information, and significant accomplishments for the year. The report is also designed to recognize the incredible people who dedicate their lives to serving the residents of our community.

2023 was a busy year for the District as continued community growth and a busy tourist season resulted in a record number of 911 calls for assistance. The District responded to 1,564 emergency incidents in 2023, which was a 10% increase from the previous year. The majority of 911 calls received were for medical emergencies (73%), while fire responses accounted for 3% of the total emergency calls. The District transported 673 patients to local hospitals in 2023 which was a 13% increase from the previous year. Most patients transported by ambulance are taken to St. Charles Medical Center in Bend Oregon. Four patients were flown to the hospital utilizing air ambulances due to their location and the severity of their injuries.

The District has a long history of significant wildfires threatening the community. 2023 was a great year for wildfires locally and across the state. There were no large fires near the District last year and only 119,000 acres burned statewide. The District did send personnel and equipment to three statewide conflagrations in 2023 as part of the Oregon Mobilization Plan. District personnel responded to the Golden Fire, Lookout Fire, and the Tyee Ridge Complex.

While there were many things to celebrate in 2023, the District suffered a tremendous loss when Volunteer Captain Dave Moyer passed away of natural causes. Dave began volunteering for the District in 1973 and was recognized at the annual awards banquet for 50 years of continuous volunteer service. Dave

was also recognized for his distinguished volunteer service with three other deserving members of the District. Chuck Newport, Tom Haynes and Rita Hodge were recognized for their volunteer service to the District and had their names added to a new bronze plaque installed at Station 701. The four volunteers recognized on the station plaque had a combined 170 years of volunteer service to the District!

The District received several grants in 2023 that allowed the organization to enhance services to the community. The Oregon State Fire Marshal grant programs provided seasonal wildland firefighting staffing capacity as well as a new firefighter/community risk position. The District also received grants for a new type three fire engine and station backup generator. In addition to federal and state grants, the District received several private donations that supported operations and volunteer association programs.

While the District experienced significant increases in service demand in 2023, the District continues to provide an exceptional level of service to the community. The District continues to work closely with our emergency response partners and community members to deliver emergency and non-emergency services. I would like to recognize the incredible people who make the District such a special place to work or volunteer. The District maintains a friendly and inclusive work environment for employees and volunteers who all contribute in unique ways. From the Board of Directors, appointed committees, career firefighters/paramedics, volunteer firefighters/EMTs, Fire Corps members, and administrative staff, everyone is dedicated to serving the Sisters community with the highest level of dedication and professionalism.

The Board of Directors is comprised of five elected community members. The primary duty and function of the Board of Directors is to establish policies for the governance of the District. It is the policy of the Board to delegate to the Fire Chief and staff the responsibility for the day-to-day administration of the District, in a manner consistent with the policies and directions of the Board.

Directors Cooper (Position 2) and Herrmann (Position 4) were appointed in Spring 2023 after one Director resigned and Director Newport retired.

The Board holds its regularly scheduled meetings on the third Tuesday of each month at 5 p.m. Traditionally, meetings are held at Fire Station No. 701, located at 301 South Elm Street in Sisters. Virtual options are available for all public meetings. The community is invited to attend and participate in the Board meetings. Public comments are accepted at the beginning of each meeting.

The Budget Committee consists of the Board of Directors and five (5) citizen members. The Budget Committee is responsible for approval of the annual budget document.



The annual budget for the Fire District is created by an internal budget team. The team is comprised of administrative staff including the Fire Chief, Deputy Chief, Finance Manager/Executive Assistant, a Board Member representative and any other interested staff and volunteers.

The committee reviews historical data from previous budgets, forecasts from local taxing authorities and insurance carriers, reports from PERS, as well as other external factors affecting the District's fiscal environment. Once the proposed budget has been reviewed and balanced by the internal team, it is presented to the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee reviews the document, makes any necessary changes, and then approves the document to go before the Board at a Budget Hearing.

One Budget Committee Meeting was held in 2023 to approve the proposed budget.

Civil Service for Firefighters is covered by Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 242.702-242.824. The Civil Service Commission is made up of three citizens of the District who are not members of the Board or employees of the District. They are independent individuals appointed by the Board for an uncompensated term of four (4) years. Bret Campbell was appointed in June 2023 to replace Sheryl McLaughlin who retired after several years on the Commission.


Primary responsibilities include working cooperatively with the Board of Directors and Fire Chief to maintain a current list of all classifications and grades of Civil Service positions within the District, overseeing proper administration of all Civil Service exams, and maintaining a current database of all employees holding Civil Service positions within the District. Commissioners also adopt and oversee the proper administration of the Rules relating to conducting Civil Service exams, appointments, promotions, demotions, transfers, reinstatements, suspensions, and discharges for Civil Service positions.

One meeting was held in 2023: to certify the Firefighter/EMT/Community Risk and Fire Safety Specialist Entrance Register and update Classification Lists.

Resident Volunteer Program

The Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District offers individuals 18 years and older the opportunity to apply for the Fire/EMS Resident Volunteer Program. The program is designed to promote

knowledge of the basic operating principles of fire and emergency medical services through day-to-day operations, hands-on experience, and actual classroom time. Resident Volunteers are trained on the principles of firefighting, fire prevention, fire control, rescue, and emergency medical services.

In addition to in-house training, Resident Volunteers are enrolled in the Fire Science and Paramedic programs at Central Oregon Community College, are assigned to a shift, and perform activities with that

shift. Resident volunteers will benefit from learning the actual conditions that may be encountered in the job market.

In 2023, the program included three returning resident volunteers and one resident volunteer lieutenant. During the year, one resident volunteer lieutenant completed the program and accepted a job at another agency. In addition, three new resident volunteers joined the program.

One of the three later resigned from the program.

Resident Volunteer Grant Dickenson was promoted to Lieutenant after Lt. Clarke accepted a job at Portland Fire. The Resident Volunteer Lieutenant position is offered to an existing resident based on budget conditions and allows them to remain in the program for one additional year and earn a bachelor's degree in Fire Service Administration or EMS Administration from Eastern Oregon University. While working under the direct supervision of the Deputy Chief of Operations, the Lieutenant is responsible for many administrative functions within the Resident Volunteer Program. The Resident Volunteer Lieutenant may also be delegated incident management functions under the direct supervision and mentorship of the shift commander.

General Fund Financial Overview

The Sisters-Camp Sherman Rural Fire Protection District is a special district operating under Oregon Revised Statutes Chapter 478 as a separate municipal corporation overseen by a Board of Directors composed of a President, Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, and two members at large. The Board employs the Fire Chief to manage the day-to-day operations of the District.

The District receives over 71% of its annual revenue through assessed property taxes with a permanent tax rate of \$2.7317 per thousand of taxable assessed value. Additional funding sources include fees for services including ambulance revenues.



The District has a fundamental philosophy of funding its programs, including capital outlay programs, through the use of General Fund dollars whenever possible. In keeping with that philosophy, the District has set aside Reserve Funds and created equipment replacement and building maintenance plans to ensure the future financial stability of the District. Also, because tax funding arrives during November, the District must have a beginning fund balance to cover operating costs from July through October.



The District received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) for its ninth year in a row. The Distinguished Budget Presentation Award is the highest award in governmental budgeting. Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District is one of only a handful of fire districts in Oregon that have received the award in 2023.

In order to receive the budget award, the District had to satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. The guidelines are designed to assess how well the District's budget serves as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide and a communications device. The budget document must be rated "proficient" in all four categories and the fourteen mandatory criteria within those categories to receive the award.

2023 Emergency Call Response


Three work shifts are staffed by a Shift Commander/Paramedic and two career Engineer/Paramedics. Resident volunteers work 48-hour shifts with 96 hours off. Additional staffing needs are met by District volunteers.


During 2023, the District responded to 1,564 emergencies including 54 fire-related calls, 1,129 EMS-related calls, 32 public service calls, 102 false alarm/good intent calls and 247 other calls. Emergency call volume increased about 10% from last

year. Patients who sought treatment at the main fire station totaled 97 for 2023. The District responded to 318 back-to-back incidents. Back-to-back incidents occur when a second incident is dispatched before the completion of the first incident.





Training

Training is an important component to our Fire District and the safety of our employees and volunteers. Volunteer drills are held on Tuesday nights at 7 pm every week. The District completed the maintenance recertification process through the Oregon Department of Public Safety Standards and Training. This process needs to be completed every two years and requires a lot of work from each of our members who hold certifications. All of our operational personnel need to complete at least 120 hours of training during the recertification period. Members holding advanced certifications need to complete additional hours of specialized training to recertify. The District's accomplishment of recertification marks the culmination of a significant amount of work put in by all of its members.

FIREFIGHTER 1 RECRUIT ACADEMY

Captain Jeff Liming continues to serve as the District's volunteer recruit academy coordinator. Under Captain Liming's direction, the District completed two recruit academies supported by several of our career and volunteer staff. To complete the academy, recruits are

required to complete about 100 hours of classroom work in addition to an equal amount of hands-on training.

Instructors, who are fully qualified firefighters, invest a significant amount of time in preparation and training delivery to ensure that recruits receive the best possible foundation. Academy recruits came from the Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District, Black Butte Ranch, and Cloverdale Fire District.

OTHER TRAINING



Through SAFER grant funding, the District was able to offer a NFPA Apparatus Equipment with an Aerial Device class in April. This was a hybrid course with both class work and hands-on training at Station 701 and the surrounding area. The lead instructor was retired Battalion Chief Scott Carmony from Clackamas County Fire District #1. Ten students from NW Fire agencies attended the class.

Several of the District's staff and volunteers participated in a one-day training program "It's All About Leadership" presented by Fire Chief Bruce Varner and Fire Chief Dennis Rubin.



Two of the District's volunteers, Roy Dean and Angel Cisneros-Thorsvold (pictured left) attended the NFPA Public Information Officer course that included classroom and field-day scenario training.

The entire department attended human resources training focused on respectful workplaces.

The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST) provided training in December on safely extinguishing car fires. A propane-based car prop was used for the training.

Other training the District offered or participated in last year includes Instructor 1 training, pumper operator, and insurance services office training.



PEER SUPPORT GROUP

The NW Fire (NWF) agencies of Black Butte Ranch, Cloverdale, and Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire Districts formed an NWF Peer Support Team. The team is available for any member of the three agencies to reach out to if they need to talk to someone confidentially about any issues they may need to work through. A survey sent out to members of the three agencies helped to identify individuals who would make up the team. Current members include Captain Duda, Captain Meredith, Fire Medic Frutos, Chief Ellison, Fire Medic Millar, Fire Medic Ulm, Lieutenant Bootes, Captain Krieck, and Fire Medic Otasu. Team members attended two trainings in 2023. One was Assisting Individuals in Crisis and the other Group Crisis Intervention.

EMS TRAINING

2023 EMS training included: Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS) recertification, shock management, protocol revision review, environmental emergencies, cardiac arrest management, case reviews with Physician Advisor Dr. Rosenberg, Zoll cardiac monitor in-service training, and joint EMS equipment orientation training with Cloverdale Fire District.



Ambulance Service Area

The Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District provides ambulance transport services to a state-approved Ambulance Service Area (ASA). The District's ASA includes franchise agreements with Deschutes, Jefferson, Lane, and Linn Counties.

ASA franchise agreements are awarded for a minimum 5-year timeframe and only one franchisee may serve in an ASA area. Franchise agreements outline standards that providers are required to follow throughout the duration of the plan.



Emergency Medical Services

The Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District is similar to most modern fire departments in that the majority of 911 emergency calls are for a medical emergency. In 2023, 73% of all emergency 911 calls received were medical. All Sisters-Camp Sherman career firefighters are also paramedics. Many volunteer firefighters and administrative staff are also certified as paramedics or emergency medical technicians.

All District emergency medical personnel provide medical care within the framework of standard medical protocols. District personnel also work under the direction of a licensed emergency physician called the Physician Advisor. Dr. Rosenberg is the District's Physician Advisor for 2023. Dr. Rosenberg is also an Emergency Room Physician for St. Charles Medical Center in Bend.

Emergency medical personnel receive annual training to maintain certification levels and also receive specialized training in high-risk/low-frequency interventions. In 2023 all District paramedics completed Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS) training.



Below is a list of the most frequent types of medical calls and the number of calls received in 2023. Many of these calls result in transport to St. Charles Medical Center in Bend or Redmond.

Cardiac arrest is not listed as one of the most frequently occurring types of medical calls but it often is the most catastrophic. If CPR is not initiated shortly after the heart stops beating, the chances of survival diminish greatly. Also important to the chances of survival is having access to an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) and rapid advanced life support ambulance response. The District actively promotes the installation of AEDs within the community and provides low-cost community CPR training. The following chart shows the number of cardiac arrests in the greater Sisters area for the past four years.

Membership programs:

The District participates in the FireMed ambulance membership program which provides coverage if residents are transported to the hospital by ground ambulance. Membership provides coverage in over 64,500 square miles of Oregon. In addition to ground transport membership programs, two air ambulance companies provide transport by rotary or fixed-wing aircraft for critically injured or sick patients. Life Flight Air Ambulance and Air Link Air Ambulance both operate within Deschutes and Jefferson Counties and offer membership programs. The vast majority of medical patients are transported by ground ambulance.

Wildfires

Sisters was once again spared from any major widlfires in 2023. The Oregon Department of Forestry credits investments in Oregon's wildland firefighting system, less lightning and the timely arrival of soaking rains in making the 2023 wildfire season one of the mildest in recent years. Total acres burned statewide were 119,526 in 2023.



The four largest fires in Oregon during the 2023 wildfire season were:

- The Flat Fire at 34,242 acres near Gold Beach
- The Bedrock Fire at 31,590 acres near Springfield
- The Lookout Fire at 25,754 acres near McKenzie Bridge
- The Anvil Fire at 22,170 acres near Port Orford

The Emergency Conflagration Act will be declared by the Governor of Oregon at the request of the Oregon State Fire Marshal. This Act provides structural protection through task forces mobilized from firefighting forces around the state when the ability to fight a fire exceeds local capabilities and a threat to life and structure exists. The Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District sent personnel and equipment to three emergency conflagrations: The Golden Fire in July 2023, the Lookout Fire, and the Tyee Ridge Complex both in August 2023. The State of Oregon reimburses local firefighting forces for expenses when mobilized under a conflagration declaration.

To boost capacity within the Oregon Fire Service, the Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) awarded nearly \$6 million in grants to the structural fire service to hire firefighting staff during the 2023 wildfire season. Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District was awarded \$35,000 in grant funding to support staffing through the 2023 wildfire season. As a result, the District added two firefighters/EMTs to each of its three shifts to help supplement regular career and volunteer staffing during peak demand hours of 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily. The District retained the additional staffing through October 2023.

The District responded to a total of 16 small brushfires throughout the District in 2023, and 6 bark dust fires.







2023 Accomplishments

1. Facilities

• The Board of Directors adopted a new Distinguished Volunteer Service policy, which established a volunteer recognition bronze plaque that was installed on the outside of each of the District's fire stations. The names of volunteers who have served 25 years or more with the District will have their names installed on the plaque and they will remain on the plaque as long as they remain good citizens. In October the District held a dedication ceremony

to unveil the new plaques and introduce the first honorees and their families. The first names included: Volunteer Tom Haynes who has served for 48 years (and still serving), Volunteer Rita Hodge who retired after 32 years of service, Captain Dave Moyer who had served for 50 years (passed away in July 2023), and Director Chuck Newport who retired from the Board after 40 years of service to the District.

- Station 701 received new interior paint throughout the building.
- New tables were purchased for the Community Hall to replace the old bulky, heavy tables. The new tables are more compact and easier for groups to set up and take down.
- The bid for door security upgrades to all stations was awarded and equipment will be installed in early 2024.

2. Equipment

 The District was awarded the Oregon State Fire Marshal's (OSFM) Engine Program Grant. This program allows OSFM to procure fire apparatus to be strategically placed around the state with recipient structure fire agencies. The District was

- awarded a Type 3 fire engine with an approximate value of \$390,000. The engine is intended to assist the District with keeping fires small and away from our community. The engine is expected to be delivered in early 2024.
- A new treadmill was added to the gym at Station 701 to replace an older unit. In addition, a commercial stair climber unit was purchased and will be delivered in early 2024.
- Medicine-infusion pumps were purchased and added to the District's three ambulances in early 2024. This equipment assists with re-dosing meds continuously
- and helps with the accuracy of medicine administration.
- The District supported the construction of a new 800-MHz radio tower site (pictured left) on its property at the Camp Sherman fire station. This tower, built and maintained by Deschutes County 911, will provide significantly improved emergency radio coverage to the Metolius Basin.

3. Resident Volunteers

- We welcomed three new Resident Volunteers in 2023 at Station 701: Jessa Hocker, Cody Martin, and Tyler Wallace joined the team. The new resident volunteers attended an advanced EMT course in Tempe, Arizona, and two earned their EMT certifications during the year. One resident volunteer left the program in late 2023.
- Resident Volunteers Campbell Clarke and Jake Van Lieu completed their resident volunteer program during the year. Campbell accepted a job as an EMT/FF at Portland Fire and Jake moved to accept a job as an EMT/FF at Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue.
- Grant Dickenson was promoted to Resident Volunteer Lieutenant.

- The District was awarded a \$255,361 grant from the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office in May 2023. The purpose of the grant is to augment firefighting and fire prevention staffing. The grant is a three-year grant that requires a tiered local match and is expected to be 100% funded through the District beginning in year four. As a result of the grant funding the District was able hire Steven Lord as the District's full-time Firefighter/EMT/Community Risk Specialist. Steven is a crosstrained responder capable of supporting the line staff on emergency fire and medical incidents as well as supporting Chief Puller in the Community Risk and Fire Safety Division.
- The District was awarded \$35,000 from the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office through the Wildfire Season Staffing Grant. This is the second year the District has received this grant. Grant funds were used to hire additional staff during the peak fire

season. The following personnel were hired to help cover emergency calls from June through October 2023: Cole Pyne, Jack Wales, Ben White, Francesca McLean, Chris

- LaMaita, Justin Spelatz, and Alan Smoke. They worked over 1,200 hours during peak call times for the District.
- Chief Johnson was awarded the Oregon Fire Chief's Association 2023 President's Award for his outstanding work and unwavering dedication to bringing updated legislation to the State of Oregon and the Oregon Fire Service.

Shared chief officer coverage has been in place since 2018. The Equipment,

International Exchange

In 2015, the Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District (SCSFD) entered into an international exchange program with Hampshire and Isle of Wight Fire Rescue Service (HIOWFRS) in the southern United Kingdom. In 2015, HIOWFRS sent five firefighters to Central Oregon to learn about American wildland firefighting. In the years since the program began, SCSFD has sent multiple firefighters, including several resident volunteers, to Hampshire to see a different way to fight fire and serve the community. It has been a career-altering experience for all who have been a part of it.

In July, the District welcomed four firefighters from HIOWFRS to Sisters for a two-week educational exchange. As in years past, the focus for the visiting team is Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) firefighting tactics and strategies as well as home risk assessments. As a result, HIOWFRS staff (Andy Weeks, Mark Woods, Andy Gussman, and Chris Sellick) came to Sisters to learn more about WUI fires where we have been working in the WUI environment for years.

Jeff Puller is the District's Community Risk and Fire Safety Manager and oversees the Fire Prevention and Fire Corps programs. Services to the community from these divisions include:

- Commercial and Industrial Fire Safety Inspections conducted by a certified Inspector.
- Fire Cause and Origin Investigations in concert with the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office.
- Wildfire Safety such as NFPA Firewise, Local FireFree & IAFC Ready, Set, Go Programs.
- Engine Company Fire & Life Safety Evaluations for low-hazard businesses.
- Home fire safety consultations.
- Fire Corps Program.
- Fire safety education and public awareness programs for all ages, school, home & business.
- Fire station tours.
- Regularly scheduled CPR and First Aid classes by certified instructors.
- Child safety car seat clinics.
- Residential smoke alarm program.
- Address sign program.
- Senior Safety Program.
- Blood Pressure Clinics.

STATION TOURS & SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Volunteers and staff hosted six school tours at Station 701 last year. Firebusters continued as in previous years with 256 students participating throughout three schools in the

SMOKE ALARMS

The District received 19 requests for service of smoke and/or carbon monoxide alarms in the community. Volunteers and staff installed 24 battery-powered smoke alarms and provided 37 batteries.

SENIOR SAFETY PROGRAMS

• Home Safety & Senior Resource Guide

The home safety program and senior resource guide were developed to bring awareness to residents of fire and fall hazards in the home. While the District has trained volunteers, who can visit homes to check for working smoke alarms and walk through the home with the occupant to look for fire and fall hazards, no home visits were requested in 2023. Home Safety and Senior Resource Guides are available to pick up at the District's Administration Offices as well as handed out during special events throughout the year.

File of Life

The file of life program was developed to assist responders with obtaining a patient's medical history. The form is filled out by a person before needing emergency medical attention, where it may be easier to recall information in a non-stressful situation. The packets are intended to be placed in an obvious location, such as a refrigerator, where responders can easily access them. These packets are available at many medical offices in Sisters, as well as the Administration Office for the District.

WILDFIRE HOME SAFETY ASSESSMENTS

Trained Fire Corps Volunteers accept requests from residents in Sisters interested in having their homes and property assessed to determine how defensible they would be during a wildfire. In 2023, volunteers assessed 30 homes.

COMMUNITY PARTNER IN HEALTH – Vaccine Clinics

Fire Corps members and RNs Katie Yates and Marti Stuker assisted with County-sponsored COVID-19 and flu vaccine clinics throughout Central Oregon in 2023. In addition to administering vaccines, duties include gathering historical information regarding adverse effects, recent COVID-19 illness, information sharing regarding proper vaccine spacing of primary and booster series, side effects, and measures of comfort.

For the past several years, the Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District has partnered with local clinics to provide vaccination clinics to Sisters residents. In 2023, the District hosted one flu vaccination clinic in the District's community hall.

ADDRESS SIGN INSTALLATION

Fire Corps volunteers install address signs to help crews quickly locate addresses within the fire district. A total of 70 address signs were made and installed in 2023.

YOUTH FIRE INTERVENTION PROGRAM

The District has two trained interventionists who evaluate youth who misuse fire and establish a plan for them. The District had one intervention program with a juvenile in 2023.

CPR/FIRST AID CLASSES

Seven Fire Corps Volunteers are trained to teach American Heart Association's Heartsaver CPR/AED and First Aid classes. 155 students were certified in 2023. These include community members and Heart of Oregon students.

BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENING

Blood pressure screenings occur on the first Tuesday of each month during the Council on Aging's Senior Luncheon. Two of our Fire Corps members attend those events to provide screenings for seniors.

CAR SEAT SAFETY CHECKS

One volunteer is certified to check child car seat safety. Regularly scheduled regional car seat clinics are held at Bend Fire. In Sisters, Beverly Halcon performed 30-seat checks in 2023.

AED GRANTS

The District set aside grant funds to encourage more businesses in the community to purchase Automated External Defibrillators. Fire Corps member Larry Stuker leads this program. Three new AEDs were added to our community! Studies have shown that public AED use increases the survivability of a heart attack.

DISTRICT AWARENESS PROGRAM

New residents within the Sisters-Camp Sherman Fire District are sent a "Welcome to Sisters Country" brochure that provides a brief description of services, programs, community activities, and volunteer opportunities. In 2023, Fire Corps volunteers sent out 43 brochures.

INCIDENT SUPPORT UNIT

The Fire Corps received the District's retired ambulance in 2021 to create an incident support unit (ISU) that Fire Corps members will be able to staff during large-scale incidents or large training events. In 2023, the ISU crews assisted in multiple training exercises and responded to their first wildfire where they provided rehab and cooling for crews on scene. ISU also assisted with two days of support for the Joint Recruitment Testing process for incoming resident volunteers.





BIKE SAFETY EVENT

The Fire Corps held a Bike Safety Event held in conjunction with Sisters Park and Recreation District's carnival.

Participants were able to visit various stations to have their bikes checked, have a helmet fitting, and ride through a bike rodeo. The event was a huge success.



Monthly meetings of the Association take place on the third Tuesday of each month.

Following are some of the Association's District-sanctioned events and special projects for 2023:

EASTER EGG HUNT

Hundreds of eager egg hunters from infant to 11 years old turned out for the 45th annual community Easter Egg Hunt. Over 6,000 plastic eggs were scattered throughout Creekside and Three Creeks Overnight parks for hundreds of children to gather. Volunteers were on hand to provide tours of emergency apparatus and to hand out prevention materials and candy. The Easter Bunny also made an appearance.

RODEO STANDBY & PARADE

District staff and volunteers staffed a dedicated ambulance with a paramedic, EMT, and driver for 5 days during the Sisters Rodeo. Members and their families also participated in the Rodeo Parade (Sisters largest parade annually).



QUILT SHOW

The entire town of Sisters was wrapped up in walls of bright colors for the 48th annual Sisters Outdoor

Quilt Show. District staff and volunteers provide help in hanging and taking down quilts throughout the entire town and also staff a First Aid booth located centrally within the City during the event.





COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE FUND

This fund was established to help members of the community who would endure further hardship without financial assistance. Under this program, employees are allowed to spend up to \$100 to assist in basic fire suppression and EMS. The fund has been created from non-public funds, including donations made to the District and employee/volunteer contributions. In 2023, a total of 34 requests for assistance were filled with a total of over \$965 in gas/food vouchers and bus tickets. The Association increased the amount of the vouchers during 2023 to account for increased fuel and food costs.

HIGH SCHOOL SPORTS STANDBY & SUPPORT

District volunteers and resident volunteers stand by as backup EMS personnel and provide an on-site ambulance for the Sisters High School varsity and junior varsity home football games. Six home games were staffed in 2023. In addition, District staff and volunteers escorted several Sisters High School

STAIRCLIMB FUNDRAISER

A team of Sisters-Camp Sherman, Black Butte, and Cloverdale Fire District staff and volunteers raised funds for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society to help find a cure for blood cancers. The team raised approximately \$16,300 in 2023. Participants (firefighters) climb 69 flights of stairs covering 788 vertical feet of distance.
